They get free passes to watch the big game in Shah Alam

THERE were no Monday blues for those who lined up early in the morning to redeem free passes to watch Tottenham Hotspurs in action at a ticket giveaway session at Menara Star in Petaling Jaya. Folks from around Klang Valley

dropped in at *The Star* for tickets to watch the English Premier League team train and play against the Malaysian League Selection tonight.

The giveaway was a joint effort between *The Star* and ProEvents International to promote Spurs' visit as part of the AIA Cup Asia Tour. It is the club's second visit to

"I will be very disappointed if he doesn't play," he said, while point-ing at Kane's photo on the exclu-sive meet-and-greet pass. Retiree Lily Yooh and her hus-band Danny Lim from Section 17, Pataling lava, arrived as early as

Petaling Jaya, arrived as early as 7am to collect their tickets for the match.

When asked about Spurs, she admitted, "I don't really know aunthed, Tuber Tealy Mow much about football, but of course I will support Malaysia," adding that she expected Spurs to win but it would be tough against the Malaysian selection.

Thomas Chooi from Kampung Sungai Kayu Ara, Petaling Jaya, who also collected a pair of tickets and exclusive meet-and-greet passes with Spurs players confessed, "Tm not a football fan, but I'm doing this for my son. "He is 11 years old and this will be his first live match," adding that his son was a "big time fan" of the EPL.

"This is unexpected, and I will bring him to meet the Tottenham players," Chooi added, in reaction

to receiving the exclusive passes. Harine Dorerajah, who accompanied her son Sanjit Kishan for the free tickets, will also be watch-ing their first live match, along

with her family.

"It will be my first time watching a live match," said Sanjit, 17, a
Liverpool supporter who will be rooting for the English side tonight.

Asked who he expected to win, he said, "Maybe Tottenham", but he agreed that Malaysia had a good chance to beat Spurs in tonight's eagerly-anticipated

match.
